



## Site Monitor Report on Batrasa February 2016




The site of Batrasa is located right next to Majaliya. One of the site's most prominent features is a building known as the Sculptor's Dwelling or (*Maskan Al-Nahhat*). Part of that building is carved out of the limestone rocks with distinctive decorative carvings on the inner walls. Archaeologist Melchior de Vogüé documented the site in detail.





# The site monitors surveyed the site and documented damages caused by:

- 1. Illegal digging by looters.
- 2. Repeated attacks on the site by regime forces and Russian air strikes.
- 3. Neglect over the last five years.
- 4. Damages due to land reclamation.
- 5. Quarrying stone from the site to be used in new construction.














